Published by the Nursing and Midwifery Council (NMC, UK) in 2009, this guidance establishes principles for best practice in the care of older

people in all settings where nursing care is provided, in both community and hospital settings.

It includes guidance for patients detailing the type of care they can, and should, expect to receive. It can also be used as a tool to challenge poor standards of care and provides employers with a set of principles to judge performance against. The guidance is for all nurses, specialist community public health nurses and midwives.

The guidance emphasizes three main elements to providing the fundamentals of care in a safe and effective way to older people are people, process and place.

Do you not distinguish between pets and comfort/service animals?

2008 marks the 40th anniversary of the passage of the federal Fair Housing Act (FHA). In the past 40 years much progress has been made in eradicating discrimination in housing. The Fair Housing Act prohibits discrimination in housing on the basis of race, color, religion, sex, national

origin, family status or disability by housing providers. Senior Living and Long Term Care are not exempt to the stipulations of this law. Senior living and senior care facilities need to be familiar with the FHA and understand how it applies to them.

This presentation reviews the requirements of the Fair Housing Act as it applies in the long term care context and discusses the implication of the Fair Housing Act on marketing, admissions and transfers, and specific operational issues, and how they affect Fair Housing in Aging Services.
